
Farmers urged to start paddy cultivation

With the onset of monsoon

The Irrigation and Water Management Ministry and the Sri Lanka Mahaweli Authority (SLMA) yesterday instructed farmers in the main agricultural areas to start paddy cultivation for the Maha season with the onset of the monsoonal rain filling the tank network in the North-Central, Eastern and Sabaragamuwa Provinces.



Irrigation and Water Resources Management Minister Ivan De Silva told Daily Mirror that instructions had been issued

to farmers to start tilling paddy fields immediately using rain water so as to save water in irrigation tanks. "We expect to release water


by November 15 and assist

farmers to cultivate the entire swathe of land available for paddy cultivation. My belief is that the Maha season will be a huge success in comparison to the last Yala season that destroyed nearly 1,75,000 hectares of paddy lands in the three Provinces," Mr. De Silva

Farmers had been instructed to sow paddy that could be harvested in 3 or 31/2 months as a measure to preserve as much water as possible in tanks.

He also said farmers had been instructed to sow paddy that could be harvested in 3 or 3 1/2 months as a measure to preserve as much water as possible in tanks. They had also been encouraged to cultivate additional crops such as maize, cowpea, groundnuts, green gram and kurakkan that required less water than paddy.

walawe and reservoirs at Ulhitiya, Maduru-Oya and Rathkinda were still in low capacity and would not be released water for cultivation, but a number of reservoirs and tanks such as Kotmale, Victoria, Randenigala, Rantambe, Castlereagh, Mousakele, Kalawewa, Rajangana Wewa, Nachaduwa, Parakrama Samudra and Ulhitiya had been filled by more than half of their capacity by yesterday, enabling the release of water for cultivation if necessary, he
